

## Letter 1: Housing



#### Dear starter.

Feel free to sign that sale agreement or, as we call it in Belgium, 'compromis'. We've lowered registration fees again. Buying a house or an apartment is already expensive enough.

Thanks to us, Brussels is a trendsetter in reducing registration fees (the tax on property purchases).

And we want to go even further. Because young, hardworking residents who usually start out by renting on the real estate market and are often single are the future of the city. They make, sustain, and improve Brussels. To anchor them here, we help make their housing dream come true. We make buying a house or an apartment cheaper. Those who buy a family home in Brussels can get a discount of up to 25,000 euros.

This reduces the purchase price. And, in order to create more rental and owner-occupied homes, we have plenty of ideas. You really can have your own home with our blue team.

## 10 building blocks for affordable living in Brussels:

- 1. By increasing the Brussels discount on registration fees, we continue to offer the cheapest registration fees.
- 2. We will link this discount to the evolution of property prices, ensuring it remains a lasting benefit for starters.
- 3. We provide an additional discount on registration fees for those who want to carry out environmentally friendly, climate-conscious renovations upon purchase.
- 4. Life is confusing enough. We align our energy performance certificate (EPC) standards with those of Flanders and Wallonia.
- 5. We abolish the 1% registration fee on mortgage loans.
- 6. We encourage the creation of new living spaces by allowing the construction of an additional floor wherever possible and desirable.
- 7. Unoccupied homes should not be profitable. Therefore, we maintain the reduced 6% VAT rate for those who demolish and/or renovate neglected properties.
- 8. Temporarily vacant properties? We offer those spaces to interested starting entrepreneurs. Win-win.
- 9. Permits should be delivered more quickly. Digitization will accelerate much in the long run, but we can already pick up the pace; by having large projects approved by the region and smaller ones by the municipality, and by using the same urban planning sales document for all municipalities.
- 10. Some employers offer a mobility budget instead of a company car. If you choose to live closer to your work, you can use that budget to pay your rent or mortgage. That is why we want to promote this, while also making it more fiscally advantageous.

## Letter 2: Education



### Dear parents,

Today: more Dutch-speaking schools. Tomorrow: a new generation of empowered Brussels residents.

Dutch-language education in Brussels is in high demand. However, the flip side of the coin is that the demand exceeds the offer. For some parents, free school choice exists only on paper.

The solution is clear. We need to build new schools and renovate or expand existing ones. This way, quality is ensured and the position of the Dutch language is strengthened in multilingual and cosmopolitan Brussels.

That multilingualism is an asset. It's unique in the world. The next generation of Brussels residents will gain enormous benefits if fully immersed in languages today. Therefore, we act on an ageold saying: old habits die hard. Ah oui.

More bricks, more classrooms, more modern infrastructure, and also: more teachers. We make the teaching profession more attractive by offering a 'Brussels bonus,' among other incentives, because teachers deserve better. Especially in a complex educational context like our capital.

# We don't shy away from stating our proposals:

- 1. We build and renovate more Dutch-speaking schools. In doing so, we pay attention to classroom technology that enhances learning.
- 2. By offering an additional bonus or at least by maintaining seniority, we address the teacher shortage.
- 3. There is a lot of hidden poverty and other disadvantages, or sometimes even abuse, in Brussels families. This can be noticed more quickly at school. We set up a direct line of communication for parents and students with CPAS/OCMW employees (the public centres for social welfare) within the schools. It is important to keep the future of our vulnerable children intact. Moreover, the earlier problems are detected, the more cost-effective the solution is for society.
- 4. It is not possible to study on an empty stomach. Can the school provide balanced warm meals to all children, even those whose households cannot afford it? These kinds of small interventions work wonders for their development.
- 5. Going to a Dutch-speaking school while holiday or extracurricular activities take place in French or vice versa? It doesn't matter. We align all school holidays. Because for Brussels residents, different school calendars often lead to a series of issues, including organizational ones.

## Letter 3: Business



### Dear entrepreneur,

If you thrive, Brussels thrives. It's high time for more freedom.
